



Securing a Letter of Affiliation for Fulbright

- Required for all Study/Research candidates
- A non-binding letter of support for your Fulbright project
- Should come from the institution/individual with whom you will be working most closely
- Affiliation requirements will vary by country
- Should be signed and on letterhead
- Letters of Affiliation are not confidential



***Of note, sometimes a Letter of Affiliation will need to be translated into English. In these cases, you can seek out a professional translator to have the letter translated into English. If you are able to, you can also translate the document into English yourself.

For graduate degree enrollment, letter of acceptance is typically your letter of affiliation.

Examples of affiliation include:

- Universities
 - Laboratories
 - Libraries
 - Non-governmental organizations
1. Affiliation must be appropriate for your proposed project
 2. Letter writer should demonstrate an understanding of your project
 3. Can have multiple affiliations, but all should be appropriate and necessary
 4. The letter should speak to the feasibility of your proposed project with that laboratory, entity, etc.

Tips:

- Start local, then branch out
 - FPA and professor & mentors on your campus
 - Speak with international students
 - Contact other professors (Nearby Campuses/Statewide)
 - National Search: Journal Articles, Fulbright Alumni Ambassadors
 - Utilize Linked-In and search Google and find a way to connect

**Remember, be professional. Let the person know how you found them and show your interest in working with them.*
